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Welcome

n the first board page I wrote as the new chair of the CMCA three years ago, I wrote about the challenges we expected to face as a relatively new board. I made the statement, 'to get to these desired outcomes, the board is going to require your support, patience and trust. These must be the basic requirements of any successful organisation. I have no issues with the membership questioning the board on its activities, and you will find that I am a very open person. My professional background has been based on providing professional information in a clear and concise manner. So, if you need to know something, just ask. After all, we are a Club.'

In last month's board page, I indicated members were discussing the proposed (unsuccessful) changes to the constitution, with some positivity and passion. However, as the date of the AGM drew closer, emotion seemed to get in the way of the facts. The board was accused of 'not being totally open and honest' when of course, under corporations law, full disclosure of all the changes as required by law and confirmed by the Club's solicitors, were provided to members. Having worked for some 40 years in a professional advisory capacity, where a potential consequence of not being honest could result in a jail term, this accusation was a little disappointing.

It was also disappointing to hear that some members accused the board of referring to a survey that was biased. In effect, it was insinuated that the board influenced Colmar Brunton. They are the largest independent and Australian owned market research agency specialising in product, services and social research.

Sadly, the board was also accused of trying to change CMCA from a club into a corporate organisation. Maybe we need to look at a few facts. There are certain trends in the structure of the Club's membership that the board is certainly concerned about. At June 2012, the Club had 28,468 full memberships with a qualifying vehicle, as required by the current constitution. At June 2017, just five years later, we now have only 25,000 full memberships. We are losing an average of 700 gualifying vehicles each year. A very common statement in any organisation is 'that if you are not growing, you are dying', and I am certain that none of us want that to happen. At June 2017, CMCA had 12,994 associate memberships, so currently, figures show that one in every three memberships hold associate memberships. The influx of associate memberships is compensating for the loss of full memberships. As a Club, how do we manage this into the future? It will be an issue that all members need to address, as the current constitution dictates that only members can make the decisions around the solutions.

Another rumour was that the board intended on changing the name of the Club. This has never been contemplated, or even discussed. It seemed this was based on a couple of factors. One, it seemed, was the changing nature of our RV fleet as mentioned above. There is no need for our Club to change its name. It also seems that members thought a name change was coming as we have numerous similar company names registered. This is necessary in order to protect ourselves from organisations or individuals wanting to make themselves look like us. Members would be unaware that last year an exmember of the Club registered Motorhome & Campervan Club of Australia, ready to establish an alternative Club. The membership fee was \$44 too, what a surprise. When our solicitors sent a stern communication to this individual, pointing out the laws around 'passing off', this matter was quickly resolved.

There have also been some stories circulating about GeoWiki. One scenario was that we had sold GeoWiki. A conflicting story was that the board decided to scrap GeoWiki. Seeing we have now more than 20,000 downloads and invested more than \$100,000 towards the platform, this would have been a strange decision. GeoWiki is a huge member benefit and we will continue investment in this product to advance its features and capabilities.

Referring to my original comment in December 2014, if you have heard something that doesn't guite sound correct, please ask the board. Our email addresses are in every edition of The Wanderer. The board must make commercial decisions on a regular basis, and we appreciate that we are accountable to the membership for these decisions. But please, don't make comments in a public domain when you are unaware of all the facts. On behalf of the board, I would like to offer you, your family and friends all our best wishes for the Christmas and New Year festive season. If you are travelling, please travel safely. Catch you somewhere in the New Year.

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


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CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE: THE SEASON OF RUSH

SUCCESS AT SANDOWN LEISUREFEST

RV enthusiasts proved the industry shows no sign of slowing down with 32,306 people attending October's Melbourne Leisurefest. The number was the highest attendance in seven years, as people flocked to Sandown Park to see more than 220 exhibits showcasing the latest model caravans, pop-tops, tents, camper trailers, motorhomes, campervans and camping and outdoor accessories.

According to the Caravan Industry Association of Victoria, senior adventurers made up the majority, however, there is an increase in family attendance.

For the first time, visitors were allowed to bring their dogs, to accommodate the 70 per cent of caravanners and campers who prefer to travel with their pet, which the CIA believes also boosted attendance.

CIA CEO Rob Lucas says the decision to allow dogs is part of its ongoing changes to ensure it continues to meet consumer demands.

"We listen very carefully to consumers needs, hence the introduction of dogs into association shows. Allowing dogs into our shows has been met with great applause from consumers with little or no concerns from exhibitors."

GEOWIKI Finding 'Places' on GeoWiki

GeoWiki opens to a map showing various 'Places' centered on your current location. To access and download offline maps, tap the 'hamburger' button (three horizontal bars) in the top left-hand corner (for android this will be a G). A new menu will appear showing the categories for predefined filters. Scroll to the bottom of this menu and select 'Map Downloads'.

Selecting 'Map Downloads' will give you access to offline maps. By downloading offline maps, you will be able to use the GeoWiki app offline (not connected to internet). To save on data usage, it is suggested that you only download the states/territories you immediately require, you can add to it later as you have available data. As it is downloading you will see a message near the top of the screen showing the progress of the download.

Once download is complete, touch the 'hamburger' button again and scroll to the bottom of the menu and select 'Map Settings'. Here you will have options to change how the maps are displayed. We suggest you turn on 'Show Map Status Bar" and 'Use Offline Street Maps', found by tapping the top box and scrolling in the fields that appear at the bottom of the screen, select "Use Offline Street Maps' and tap 'Done'. Depending on how you wish to view your maps you can also turn on or off 'Rotate Maps' or '3D Maps'. Once completed, tap the 'hamburger' button to return to the menu section.

am privileged to be able to present this Chairman's Report, my third in this role. I am very honoured to be the Chairman of the CMCA Board of Directors, for a Club we all hold very close.

Once again, it has been a busy year with many positive outcomes. As a national Club with some 70,000 members, residing in every state and territory, there are the challenges of communicating Club philosophy, Club culture, and Club direction. We all have a role to play in this communication process.

As a board, we are well aware of our duties and responsibilities to CMCA. We regularly look at our short and medium-term planning, and in 2015, the board developed a strategic plan for the next three years. Back in January, as we do each year, we completed our annual review of this plan, and it was updated to cover the period 2017 - 2020. These pillars include membership, communications, member benefits, and finance and administration.

Much of the 2017 calendar year has consisted of discussion around the proposed changes to the CMCA constitution, a vote we will take later today. The constitution has not had a substantial

review for many years, and to some degree it is outdated by way of terminology, and overall it is not a well-structured legal document. I do not wish to open the discussion at this point as we will have suitable time during the course of this meeting for that. However, whatever the outcome, it will be the will of the members in a normal democratic process to decide. The board has been openly accused of being dishonest and hiding issues from members during this process. These accusations are disappointing. It was announced to members in 2015 that the board had intended to follow this process. In 2017, six board pages in The Wanderer addressed the constitutional review and proposed amendments. The Wanderer's monthly CEO page also addressed many aspects of the process. Much information has been disseminated to members via other platforms including our eNewsletter, the CMCA Member Forum, and social media. How members can now accuse the board of non-disclosure, describing the review as 'bit of a shock' that we get to where we are today is quite amazing.

An important aspect of CMCA, and a big part of the strategic plan, is our promotion of 'freedom of choice'. We must all continue promoting this message, and we need to be seen as environmentally friendly RV travellers. This is about a responsible and sustainable RV community, words that come straight out of our Club's vision. This year, we completed our own 'CMCA Self Containment Policy. This has had some controversy amongst the membership. The board were aware that not all members had complying vehicles. It is understood though that many more could comply, with relatively low-cost modifications to their RVs. This policy was not about exclusion.

In the last two weeks, an article appeared in the publication 'Caravan & Motorhome on Tour'. The article was titled 'The Great Grey Water Debate'. The opening line of the article states that 'The truth of the matter is, this is the biggest regulation to hit free campers in the past decade - not having a self-contained setup could cost you money and time in Australia's best freedom camps'. Phrases such as 'beneficial for the longevity of free and freedom camping' and 'allowed to camp in designated campgrounds across the country - the numbers for which are exponentially growing' are used. The article looks at the trends overseas as well. In all of this, the efforts of the CMCA are acknowledged. It also mentions a number of regions that are either backing our CMCA initiative or have their own selfcontainment regulations. The last sentence defines the intent of the article, 'while this means we might have to tweak our setups, it's a small price to pay to ensure our free and freedom camps remain open for years and years to come'.

RV Clubs of Australia Limited (RVCAL), formerly MoTOURing, continues to meet twice a year. This is a Company Limited by Guarantee (same as CMCA), consisting of CMCA, the National

Association of Caravan Clubs (NACC) and the Australasian Touring Caravan Motorhome & Caravan Club (ATCMCC). RVCAL will continue to promote the interests of RV travellers, utilising the force of numbers when it seems necessary. Certainly, the meetings provide the opportunity to discuss many aspects of RV and travelling issues. I am currently the Chairman of that board, and Gary Rebgetz also represents CMCA. We have recently discussed a more formal strategic plan for RVCAL, so this will be on the CMCA webpage once approved by all members of that board.

I would like to make a few comments on some other issues that I know our Chief Executive Officer Richard Barwick will also address.

The Wanderer: As we know, there are some major challenges around the future of our monthly magazine. I will go into more of the financial issues in the Finance Report. But please note, the intent of the Board is to continue producing the best quality, hard copy of the magazine until we have exhausted all possibilities.

Club Connect/website: The previous IT system, including the administration and website, were very ordinary. For the last four or so years, the board and staff have been continually challenged on a daily basis. This last year saw the launch of our new IT system, which is now totally operational. The board has approved expenditure for continued improvement to our website, which will see more developments around our RV Friendly program and Events microsite will provide members the opportunity to better plan their travels.

GeoWiki: This product will continue to be high on the board's list of priorities. Further expenditure has been approved to improve the operations of GeoWiki to meet the needs of members. We now have some 19,000 downloads which is up by some 30% from just 12 months ago.

CMCA Member Forum: We all know that online forums are not for all and they don't come without some issues. However, the CMCA Member Forum now has 5,200 registered users, which is an increase of 80% over last year. The number of topics has increased by some 85% so there is certainly substantial information available to all members who wish to participate.

CMCA RV Parks: The last year has proven a lot more productive than previous years. We have successfully established parks in Railton, TAS, and Euston, NSW, on the Murray River. We have two further parks in the construction stage, being Bundaberg, QLD and Penola, SA. There are a few others that are still in negotiation, so at last we are gaining some momentum.

Now I would like to thank the many people who willingly volunteer their time on behalf of CMCA. We only have to look around this rally site to see how this works. We also have our state representatives and their national member service teams. So much is achieved by this Club on the back of the hard work done by our volunteers.

Next, I would like to thank my fellow Directors, Lorraine Smith, Eleanor Scully, Gary Rebgetz, and Richard Mainey. Their contribution and commitment to CMCA is substantial. Lorraine is to now retire from the board, not seeking re-election at the recent election. We certainly owe Lorraine our gratitude for her efforts and work done on behalf of CMCA.

I would like to congratulate Kim Atkinson on her election to the board and Gary Rebgetz on his return. We should also acknowledge Arthur Bugden and Rick Banyard, who were prepared to put their names forward to the members, but were unsuccessful.

I should also thank our CEO Richard Barwick and all the very committed staff at head office for their hard work and support over the last year.

AGM Chief Executive Officer's Report

ear members,

Many new and exciting developments have occurred during the past year, including the brand-new IT system and website. The overall update of the company's constitution has been at the forefront of moving the Club forward into the future.

I am pleased to present my report for the financial year ended 30 June 2017. Following are the highlights of 2016/17.

MEMBERSHIP

As at 30 June 2017, the Club had 37,994 financial memberships. This represents a net increase of 1900 memberships over the past 12 months. This is reflected with a 5.8% increase in our member subscriptions income. This increase is an amazing effort and I would like to thank you for encouraging other RV enthusiasts to join our great club and along with the Club's marketing campaigns. I ask you to continue spreading the word and promoting your Club. The new IT system and website has made joining easier and we have had 5896 new memberships in this financial year. We will continue to encourage new membership by attending consumer shows and through sustained marketing campaigns. Membership retention is also a priority of ours. This is done through emails and phone calls to lapsed members who may have forgotten to renew their membership with the Club.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP

Honorary Life Membership is awarded to members in recognition of outstanding service to the Club. Potential life members are nominated by fellow members and recommended to the board. No Honorary Life Membership was awarded during the year. A special CMCA Medal was awarded to Don Mackrill T16082 for his dedicated work towards the establishment of the CMCA RV Park in Railton, TAS, and continued effort in assisting the Club. A big thank you to Don for his commitment in this area.

REPRESENTATION TO GOVERNMENT

We continue to be the premier representative of recreational vehicles Australia wide. The board and I, with support from state representatives and the national member services team, are active in this area. The Club attend many LGA conferences across the country. I would like to thank all volunteers for their time and efforts.

STRATEGIC PLAN

The strategic plan is an ongoing document that is constantly reviewed and updated by the board. The objectives in the plan include growing and retaining membership, guaranteeing financial security, maximising the environmental message of selfcontainment and Leave No Trace®, and importantly, the 'freedom of choice' message. In line with the strategic plan we are growing our CMCA RV Parks, with more parks being established. The strategic plan can be viewed on the website.

NATIONAL HEADQUARTERS

The past year has seen limited changes to NHQ staff. We welcomed a new Member Services Officer in Tegan Morgan-O'Brien. NHQ has installed solar panels for our electricity supply to the building and we have noticed a considerable savings already of at least 25%. We also have implemented a new database. I would like to thank members for their assistance in transitioning to the new system which will be able to support us administratively for many years to come.

WORKPLACE HEALTH & SAFETY

The Club is constantly updating its WHS policies and procedures, and this year was no different to ensure compliance in all facets. This is essential in our business management in order to minimise all risks to the company.

CHAPTERS

This year saw the board form and endorse two new Australia wide Chapters. The Club's 103rd chapter is the Geiro Gatherers, which was formed in December 2016, and the 104th chapter is the Aussie RV Travellers, which were established in May 2017. I would like to officially welcome both chapters and wish you all many fun times ahead.

THE WANDERER

In April 2016, the board approved the change in publishers of The Wanderer magazine, which was implemented from the November 2016 edition. The magazine was to be published by Bauer Media. As the Chairman mentioned in his address and will also detail in the 2017 Financial Report, The Wanderer magazine has become a substantial financial risk to the organisation. While it is considered as a premier RV lifestyle publication, it has come at alarming cost to the organisation compared to previous years. There are two significant factors, being the decline in print adverting (between 30-40% nationally) and the quadrupling of distribution costs through Australia Post. Garry Lee forecasted this financial risk at last year's AGM and unfortunately it has come to fruition, despite certain control measures put in place. At the end of the financial year we have minimised the impact with a change of publishers, with Bauer & CMCA severing ties from 30 June 2017, and an agreement was made to use Adventures Group Holdings from August 2017. In the new agreement, we have a new and viable pricing structure to produce The Wanderer, however the two factors that are out of the Club and managements control, print advertising revenue and distribution costs, still exist. Our aim is to continue to minimise the loss on the magazine by looking at enhancing other associated revenue streams and working with our new publishing company. One way members can assist is to start accessing the online and digital version only. This will assist by eliminating production and distribution costs; however, you will get the magazine freely online and will be able to read it the same way as hard copy.

NATIONAL RALLY

The Club's 31st National Rally in Canberra, ACT, was held in October 2016, and our very last Anniversary Rally, was held in Pontville, TAS, in March. Both rallies, although very different in their own rights, were enjoyed by many. I would like to thank our rally managers, Cathy Lee (Canberra) and Pete & Trish Gallagher (Pontville), and the wonderful and dedicated volunteers who went beyond to ensure success on both occasions. I would also like to thank the major sponsors of our rallies, which include EPIC, GME, Beyond Bank, The Tradies Club, Ken Tame & Associates, Kea Campers, Avida, Sydney RV, Events Tasmania, and BioMagic. Rallies are for all members, making them one of the largest Member Benefits on offer. We appreciate feedback from members, which can be done by completing the rally survey. All thoughts and suggestions for improvements are very welcome.

CMCA WEBSITE

The Club's website has undergone a total overhaul and we are very happy with the new look and feel. A lot of members have already made use of renewing their membership, registering for rallies, placing a Members' Market ad, and updating their details. If you are still unsure or need a username and/or password, please contact us at NHQ. You can still renew, register for rallies, place a Members' Market ad, purchase products from the Club Shop, and update your details, with ease and effectiveness. The website is also a great place for new members to join. I encourage you to use this site as much as you can.

GEOWIKI

The new generation GeoWiki was officially launched in 2015 at the 30th National Rally in Albany, and with more than 19,000 downloads to date, it is proving to be a major success and a fantastic member benefit. At the time GeoWiki was launched, a working party was established to ensure the continual improvement and development. This includes frequent work on the web version, the app, and the GPS files. The working party consists of two Directors, Lorraine Smith and Richard Mainey, two moderators, Arthur Bugden and Peter Milliken, NHQ staff member, Lillie Sinclair, and GeoWiki developer Justin Derry. Whilst the working party and moderators have worked extremely hard over the past two years to ensure the accuracy of GeoWiki, I encourage all members, whilst on the road, to make further contributions, whether this be a review of a site, submitting an image, or a brand-new entry, we value the information and believe it is your hard work that has contributed to the success.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the wonderful volunteers, as well as Justin Derry and his team, in developing and continuing to improve this fantastic member benefit.

CMCA RV PARKS

We have opened two more CMCA RV Parks in the past year, Railton in TAS and Euston in NSW. Along with Ingham in QLD, the parks will be popular areas for our members to stay. I would like to thank the custodians for their assistance in running our CMCA RV parks. Without their assistance, this would be difficult to manage. More custodians are always welcome and custodian training is available at the rally. I would like to thank Ray Jones and the support of the Euston Club in particular, for their wonderful contribution in developing our CMCA RV Park alongside their very impressive club in Euston. I'd also like to recognise the efforts of Don Mackrill and Kentish Council for the development of the park in Railton, which was officially opened in late March. Moving forward, we have two sites approved for development with another six in the planning (DA being prepared) prior to development. These are concentrated around TAS, NSW, VIC, SA, and QLD. We are always actively looking for suitable land in areas around the country, and if you identify a potential site, that may be appropriate, please contact NHQ.

CMCA MEMBER FORUM

The CMCA Member Forum has been operating well, with many members participating in accordance with the Forum User Agreement. I would like to congratulate the majority of forum users for utilising the forum for what it is intended for; a great platform for exchanging ideas and information. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the team of moderators who work hard to monitor the content and conduct. It's yours to use, please respect it.

MEMBER ADVANTAGES

The Club is constantly looking to expand and develop substantial Member Advantages for our members. We are very proud to have the support of Ken Tame & Associates, who continue to provide a wonderful service to CMCA via their RV tailored insurance. This now includes the Roadside Assistance Program which is well accepted by the members. In the last 12 months, we have secured great deals through Specsavers, and also Cruise Express, who offer customised designed cruises throughout the world. We have gained several more Member Advantages for members. You can view these retailers, who offer a variety of excellent discounts and offers, on our website and in The Wanderer.

FACEBOOK

I hope you have had the opportunity to enjoy reading my weekly message via Facebook. Our Facebook page now has over 18,000 page likes, proving to be an excellent form of communication. As we look to the future, Facebook and other social media platforms will certainly be used as a new member resource.

RV FRIENDLY TOWN™ PROGRAM

More and more towns across the country have joined the RV Friendly Town™ Program, with 312 towns now accredited. The RV Friendly Destinations have also grown in number with 147 destinations now involved.

CMCA DOLLAR WISE CARAVAN PARKS & MEMBER STOP OVER'S

The CMCA Dollar Wise Caravan Park Network continues to be popular with CMCA members.

These are caravan parks that offer members sites at \$10 per vehicle per night or less. The criteria is different at each park, some will offer basic self-contained sites, while others will have amenities included in the price. A list of participating Dollar Wise Parks can be found on the Club's website. Please patronise these parks and always respect their conditions. The Member Stop Over Facility has also grown in popularity. MSO's are private properties of members, who allow other members to stop over at no cost. This initiative gives property owners the pleasure of meeting new and interesting people, and sharing in the camaraderie associated with the lifestyle. Visitors to MSO's will have access to safe, relaxing, and no cost overnight parking.

IN CLOSING

I would like to thank my staff for their commitment over the past year. Without good staff, you don't have a good business - I have both. I also thank the Board of Directors for their support, given to both myself and National Headquarters. I extend my congratulations to Gary Rebgetz on his re-election to the Board and to Kim Atkinson for her election. I would like to thank Lorraine Smith, who did not stand for re-election, for her commitment and time as a CMCA Director.

2017 AGM Finance Report

Presented at the Seventeenth Annual General Meeting of the Campervan and Motorhome Club of Australia Limited, held at Bundaberg, QLD, on Monday October 09, 2017.

t is with pleasure that I present the 2016/17 Financial Statements and Reports to the members of CMCA. I will provide some key comments and explanations on these figures, and provide some insight into the financial challenges facing our Club.

CMCA is quite obviously in a very strong financial position, and the 2016/17 financial year results added to that situation. The Net Assets of CMCA at 30 June 2017 are \$7,050,016 as compared to \$6,780,013 at 30 June 2016.

The financial result for 2016/17 is a Profit of \$289,050 as compared to the previous financial year of \$383,595

The Gross Revenue is \$3,443,205 as compared to \$3,482,283 in 2015/16.

The main movements are:

Membership Subscriptions of \$1,637,932 show an increase of \$90,390 or 5.8% over 2016.

Insurance Scheme income of \$1,018,551 show an increase of \$126,154 or 14.1% over 2016.

Rally Income of \$412,798 is a decrease of \$98,604 or 19.2% over 2016. Rally Expenses were \$587,043 similar to 2015/16 but

the Rally Losses totalled \$174,245 as compared to \$61,054 the previous financial year. Both rallies in Canberra and Tasmania did not meet expectations in respect to attendance numbers. The Canberra loss was \$73,870 and the Tasmanian loss was \$100,375.

The Wanderer Income of \$53,059 is a decrease of \$79,814 or 60% over 2016. The Wanderer Expenses were \$372,603, an increase of \$333,382 from the previous year. I will discuss The Wanderer in more detail, later in this Report.

Overall the Total Expenditure for 2016/17 was \$3,154,155, only a minor increase of the \$3,098,688 for 2015/16. There were significant reductions in our Employee Costs, Marketing and Consulting, NHQ Office Operations, Travel and Accommodation, and Depreciation and Amortization. You would have noticed for the last two years that we now have a line item for the operations of our CMCA RV Parks. Presently, these are operating at a loss, quite simply because they have been free for members to use. This has now changed with access to all three parks being an administration fee of \$3 per person per night. It seems that some members thought these were going to be at no cost in the long term, and I am not sure how that message was communicated as it was always the intention that there would be a charge eventually. There is an expectation that these parks will continue to operate at a loss until more parks are developed, and this will lead to a greater usage by members and economies of scale.

We receive quite some interest from our members on the actual cash position of the Club. The figure at 30 June 2017 is \$6,522,823. So, even with abnormal capital expenditure over the last two financial years on the Club Connect/website computer system, GeoWiki, and three CMCA RV Parks, we have been able to accumulate additional cash reserves, an excellent result showing the resilience of the financial position of our Club.

CHALLENGES

I did report last year that the Club profits were being squeezed with increasing expenses and a relatively fixed revenue. I think we can all see that for 2016/17, without the increase in Membership Subscriptions and our Insurance Scheme revenue, we would have been looking at a much smaller profit. The board, CEO Richard, and our management accountant Wylva, are certainly aware of this and continually review those areas where the CMCA is most at financial risk.

We need to look at the current membership structure of the CMCA to identify these risks and put in place a plan to alleviate the potential loss. At 30 June 2012, we had 28,468 Full Members. At 30 June 2017, that number has reduced to 25,000, a decrease of 3,468 or 12% over this 5-year period. We now have a total of 37,994 Memberships. So, Associate Members are 12,994 or 1 in every 3 members, essentially one-third of the Club. Membership Subscriptions and Insurance Scheme income generated from these Associate Members contribute Gross Revenue of \$640,510. If Full Membership numbers continue to decrease at the current rate, and if the growth in Associate Membership slows down, or in fact starts to decline as Full Memberships are, CMCA is heading for a financial disaster. So, if we all take the attitude, it is not my role to attract new members or try to retain existing members, it is obvious where the Club is heading. There are a few alternatives for CMCA to address these issues, the majority of which are controlled by the members, not the board. The question is how quickly can the membership react to limit this potential loss.

In all of this, the board has no intention of reducing expenditure on those core areas, our 'freedom of choice' and government representation, member benefits and IT with our Club Connect, Webpage and GeoWiki. All areas necessary to improve the member experience of being part of the CMCA.

I should also add that the board has no intention of increasing fees or bringing any motion to the membership for an increase in fees. Through this whole constitution review process, the intent of changing the constitution so that the board can set the fees has been scrutinized and questioned so many times. I even wrote the February's edition of *The Wanderer* on this single subject. Even as recent as a few weeks ago, I saw a comment on our own CMCA Member Forum along the lines, 'why would you trust the board'. How can this Club progress or even operate with members who make statements like this?

In the 2015 AGM Finance Report delivered at the national rally in Albany, I stated 'the times when publishers paid organisations to produce their magazine is now a thing of the past. The hard copy magazine advertising has diminished sharply mainly through the economic conditions and vendors are now preferring digital advertising. The only problem is that expenditure on digital advertising is not growing at the same rate as hard copy magazine advertising is reducing'.

In the 2016 AGM Finance Report delivered at the national rally in Canberra, I stated that 'CMCA can now no longer expect this publication to be a revenue source'. I explained the tender process we had conducted over a six-month period for a new publisher, as our contract with our existing publisher was to expire on 30 June 2016. Our first choice Bauer Media produced their first The Wanderer in November 2016. The two main reasons for this choice were that Bauer's presentation to the board was much more professional than the other two tenders'. The board did believe that they could deliver on their promises. And by virtue of them being a national company, with some large publications under their belt, we believed that they would be able to generate a greater revenue from advertisers. Since our financial arrangement was based on a share of the advertising revenue after covering the costs of producing The Wanderer, this was critical for CMCA. The first few months were fine with only small losses. Production costs against advertising revenue was acceptable and quite predictable. Their statements about being able to generate additional advertising looked like coming to fruition, but by March/April, CMCA were incurring losses of approximately \$50,000 per month. This was guite obviously unsustainable. So, by May, a new publisher was appointed and it was then a matter of negotiating a suitable exit from our contract. Part of that exit was an \$80,000 discount on the amount we owed Bauer negotiated by CEO Richard Barwick. August's The Wanderer has been delivered by our new publisher, Adventures Group Holdings Pty Ltd. The Board has received many member submissions and input on how they believe The Wanderer should be published and delivered in the future. The board has considered these submissions but it always seems to come down to 'I like, my wife likes, our hard copy of The Wanderer turning up in our letterbox every month'. This continues to be the key message to the board and I have already stated that the overriding issue with the Board is that we must continue producing a guality magazine. We all know that The Wanderer is the public face of the CMCA, it is one of the 'key hooks' for new members joining the Club. So at this time, this is what we will keep doing. Our new publisher believes it can get into a breakeven position in 12 months. Rob Gallagher, CEO and co-owner of Adventures Group addressed the board at August's Board Meeting, so he understands the board's position. I must say, you will see some commercial changes, we are trying to save The Wanderer, don't forget. Our CEO Richard is in constant contact with Adventures Group, and our management accountant Wylva, recently visited their office in Melbourne to meet with their accountant. This is very much a 'watching brief'.

All members should be aware that our auditors saw the need to qualify our Audit Report this year. The qualification does not detract from the financial results of the Club, nor does it reflect on the financial stability of CMCA. Members should read that part of the PWC Independent Auditor's Report 'Basis for qualified opinion'. Simply, these are the funds held by the chapters and special interest groups. The auditor has now discussed the issues with the board and management, and we will just need to introduce a more formal system around the recording of these funds.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

I would like to thank CEO Richard Barwick and management accountant Wylva Hall, for their contribution and commitment to the sound financial management of our Club. These two CMCA staff members have the main responsibility for the day to day operations and do an exceptional job on our behalf.

undreds of RVs rolled into the Queensland coastal city of Bundaberg in October for the 32nd National Rally, to a red carpet welcome by the region.

On the first day alone more than 600 RVs pulled into the Bundaberg Recreational Precinct grounds, home for the nine days of the rally; while in total, more than 920 RVs attended from all over the country.

A huge billboard welcomed CMCA members on arrival to the city, a literal sign of how we were to be treated during the course of the event.

Mayor Jack Dempsey had been a strong vocal supporter of CMCA, and encouraged locals to do everything they could to welcome members, saying the visit would be a huge economic injection into the region - and that it was.

It's estimated about two million dollars was spent in preparation,

and over the nine days, by CMCA members, with retail spend at \$363,000.

Rally manager Paul Scully says those are conservative estimations. He says stallholders in the Searles RV Trade Centre alone were pleasantly surprised at the volume of business.

"There was a diverse representation, including a massage business, and mattress retailer, and they were all wildly successful, which was intriguing given the types of businesses participating. "All of those in the trade centre also said there weren't any slow periods, so that was a nice surprise."

Mayor Dempsey was certainly under no illusion as to the impact members had on local trade.

"It was an absolute privilege and honour to have CMCA for the national rally in the area, and certainly the way they contributed

both socially and economically.

"CMCA is a living national icon that transverses the nation, and certainly all levels of Government should look at this particular group to be able to necessitate how they can do things better in their community."

With support like that, it's clear to see why the city was recently named a CMCA RV Friendly Town.

ARRIVAL

I drove to Bundaberg (with stops at parks along the way, which you'll hear about in the January edition) in the luxury of the Paradise Independence Deluxe. While initially nervous about driving the roughly 450 kilometres from Gold Coast (due to it being a 28 foot, seven tonne big rig, and having the family on board), once we got through the busy Bruce Highway, it was smooth sailing all the way! I was surprised at how easy the Paradise was to drive. You just put it in gear, and you're off. It also proved economical and we only filled up once the entire journey.

Perfect for a family of four, our Paradise had a dual cab seat in the back (see photo on page 26) and a fold down sofa bed. If you have older kids or grandkids, there's also plenty of floor space for a blow-up mattress. Vital for us, during our nine-day adventure was storage to pack away all the suitcases and, in my younger son's case, oversized teddy bear, and the Paradise has it in abundance.

Once parked in our site at the rally (which created some entertainment as I reversed into position), we were out and about chatting with members, including neighbouring Paradise owners Mary and Mike Vigan Q24159, who have had their Paradise for one year, their fourth motorhome. The couple are on the road six months of the year, and as with many who buy a motorhome, Mike says, "I wished we started 10 years ago."

The resounding message from talking to members was, not only that they wished they hit the road earlier, but also that they want to see as much of Australia as possible. but participated in all manner of festivals, events and activities themselves. While most travel north during the winter months, a bit of rain certainly doesn't bother anyone, and nor was it going to be an issue at the rally, which was just as well!

RALLYING MEMBERS

The grounds were awash when members arrived, but whether it was disc bowls on the vast lawn, or meandering around the food court, members were out and about chatting with others; and as is the nature of these types of things, the umbrellas were soon up for a different reason, as the sun blazed down, providing glorious 30 degree days.

When not learning from talking to each other at the rally, there were no shortage of more formal sessions, whether it was a dog

education seminar with Australian dog whisperer, Chris de Aboitiz, who was providing tips on how to keep your dogs under control while travelling, to a battery and low voltage techtalk and sessions on safety on the road.

In the Searles RV Trade Centre, Bundaberg North Burnett Tourism offered day trips from tasting the famous Bundy Brews, to exploring its backyard of the Southern Great Barrier Reef - and if the queue to book was anything to go by, it was clear this was going to be a win-win for everyone.

ALL ABOARD

One of my personal highlights was a day trip with members to Lady Musgrave Island with Lady Musgrave Experience. Besides both of my children 'feeding the fish' shall we say, their stomachs soon settled and before we knew it we were walking around the 34.6 acre (14 hectare) coral cay on Australia's Great Barrier Reef. The colours are simply stunning. Crystal clear blue water and the island fascinating, with its enormous number of black noddy tern birds nesting in abundance in the Pisonia trees. Never before have the boys approached a bird so close, which didn't so much as flinch.

The island is a national park and was named after the wife of a colonial governor of Queensland, Sir Anthony Musgrave, and can only be reached by boat. The boat ride takes about two and a half hours, and beside the birds, trees and coral, it's untouched. You can freedom camp on the island, but numbers are limited and the island has no fresh water supply, and only a composting toilet.

Our transfer back to the big boat was via a glass bottom boat, providing the perfect chance to see the stunning coral and sea life of the southern Great Barrier Reef. Concerns about the vulnerability and pollution of the reef could not be seen here, the fish were vibrant and active, and the coral a vast array of colour.

Then it was a chance to kick back and enjoy a gourmet lunch, before snorkelling with turtles and in the case of our group, a reef shark!

Lady Musgrave Experience was founded by Brett Lakey, and it's certainly an experience you'll never forget. Lakey also offers an overnight option to sleep on the reef, and has plans to add a luxury arm to the business.

BACK IN BUNDY

Back in Bundy, we hit the grassed food court, where Ed's Tucker Box was a huge hit with members, with queues up to 30 people deep at times. The food is prepared by former chef Eddie Delves. who dished up such delights as Peking duck pancake with hoisin, cucumber and spring onion; and angel chicken pieces wrapped in bacon, crumbed and shallow fried served with a mango sour cream, so it was little wonder the queues were so long.

The food court area was one of two seated areas where members could congregate, and as Paul Scully notes, "people do come to the rally to talk about life on the road and it's a great opportunity to talk to people with a similar outlook."

He says having two lay days was another great way to ensure people have time to chat.

Waking the next morning, I watched the disc bowls and then took a walk around the enormous site, again talking to members and reflecting on all the work which has gone into this mammoth event.

There were people in craft breakout rooms (including the selfproclaimed 'stitch and bitch' group), dozens of people buying from the trade centre (as mentioned earlier), people listening to poetry, seminars, and others simply having a cuppa.

Everyone a proud CMCA member. Proud of what the Club is doing, or has achieved, and proud to say they are part of it.

All members, of course, have varying views on the RV they drive/ or should drive, and how many kilometres you should do per day, or how long you are on the road as this is all based on personal preference, but I quickly realised most share the same dream – to simply get out as see as much of this great country as we can. Something I certainly plan to do more of.



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CONSERVING THE COASTAL DREAM

How four WA shires banded together to preserve the great Aussie RV coastal dream

hile more and more coastal caravan parks are being turned into commercial developments, four shires in Western Australia have gone to great lengths to preserve a chunk of the WA coastline for future generations to enjoy coastal camping.

The stretch of coast, along the Coral Coast in the Mid West of Western Australia, is a three hour drive north of Perth, an area which sees many RVs pass through via the Brand Highway (particularly during wildflower season) or along the Indian Ocean Drive, meandering through Nambung National Park to see the famous Pinnacles desert.

There's plenty of walking and cycling trails and local residents day trip to the area for 4WD adventures, fishing, bird watching, snorkelling, surfing on giant white sand dunes and swimming in Ellendale Pool, a natural watering hole along the Greenough River.

If this 340kms of pristine

coastline existed anywhere else in Australia, the area might be prime real estate for coastal condos and high rises, but the local towns here have made it a priority to retain the coast specifically for the selfdrive leisure tourism market, and preserve freedom camping, right on the beach at popular spots such as Cliff Head, or low cost camping at Sandy Cape.


A COLLABORATIVE EFFORT

Spearheaded by Nicole Nelson, Acting Director Planning, Community and Infrastructure, at the Shire of Irwin, the \$2.5 million Coastal Nodes Project included short stay campsites, which are among 200 campsites in the Mid West, including those at Sandy Cape in the Shire of Dandaragan, Milligan Island in the Shire of Coorow, Cliff Head in the Shire of Irwin and Lucky Bay in the Shire of Northampton.

When the shires first teamed up with support from the Mid West Development Commission, and Tourism Western Australia, seeking funding from 'Royalties for Regions' (a government initiative enhancing regional development), the goal was to simply put a serious refresh on the area's much-loved coastal campsites. This was in order to attract both the self-drive tourism market and fishing and aquatic day-trippers, and open up the region from as far south as the Indian Ocean Drive to the north at Lucky Bay, south of Kalbarri.

The local governments, which share the region's boundaries, then decided to join forces to make the area a self-drive drawcard with a shared commitment to refreshing camping and campground infrastructure. The project was extended to include not only refreshing the sites and facilities, and planting native species of vegetation, but also included the rehabilitation of old access tracks and entry points off the main road to 'open up' the Mid West coast and increase access.

Now complete, the 'Coastal Nodes Project' is expected to attract an

additional 4,700 people annually bringing an additional \$585,000 into the region. But like any new project, it brought with it its own set of challenges, says Nicole Nelson.

"Some local governments received enquiries from residents who were concerned about opening up their favourite fishing and camping spots to the nation, but each site is well separated from the next, so there's lots of privacy and lots of sites on offer." She says, "this project is also quite rare in that four local governments in two development boundaries have worked together in one development".

"It did mean regular meetings were not always possible in person, so there were constant emails, and regular phone conferences being sent to the team to ensure everyone was on track."

Nelson also adds that the locations proved to be tricky to redevelop, as they were without both water or power, and had limited accessibility, meaning everything needed to be carted in, "products were specifically designed to ensure protection from

the elements to ensure they were low maintenance, because the infrastructure needed to be able to stand up to the harsh coastal conditions of wind, salt and rust, and withstand the test of time."

THE BIGGER PROJECT

The project is one of six priorities identified within the Mid West Tourism Development Strategy 2015-2025, which focuses on increasing accommodation capacity from camping through to resorts, and opening up day use sites places previously overlooked or under developed.

She says other priorities include opening up the Abrolhos Islands to visitors and the Kalbarri National Park iconic skywalk, which is currently underway.

THE RESULT

So far, Nicole says, they have received overwhelmingly positive feedback.

"The response has been extremely positive with users doing all our marketing for us on social media, including drone footage of the locations placed on YouTube.

"All sites are being well utilised and users are supporting the participating local governments by purchasing their supplies from the nearby towns of Kalbarri, Northampton, Dongara, Port Denison, Leeman, Green Head and Jurien Bay."

She says the collaboration allowed the local governments to develop great working relationships, so they can look for ways in which they can include the whole Mid West region, working alongside the Mid West Development Commission and Tourism WA in attracting visitors as well as creating economic benefit to the region.

As the Project Manager, the Shire of Irwin has also spoken at several tourism and local government conferences to inspire other regions to work together to achieve similar great results.

"Following our start up, Tourism WA took the idea to local governments in the South West of the state who also developed 11 campsites across six local governments," she says.

"We are proud to have lead this project, it's great to identify a need, but to successfully see the project to completion is another thing. It has taken us several years of

careful planning, talking to the right people and collaboration, and we're now seeing the benefits through visitors' positive feedback.

"To make a difference we needed the entire region to be RV friendly, not just one town, and are confident the RV market will travel from the other side of Australia to support the region and travel the beautiful coastline."

THE FUTURE

The concept is one Tourism Western Australia was quick to support.

"Western Australian beaches are regularly voted among the best in the world, and with good reason," says Tourism Western Australia's CEO Steve Wood.

"Along its 12,500 kilometres of coastline, you'll find some of the most stunning World Heritage scenery, once-in-a-lifetime wildlife encounters, and endless opportunities for beach holiday memories.

"Camping in WA is a great way to immerse yourself in the worldrenowned natural wonders and diversity of Western Australia's coast."

For the Shire of Irwin, the campaign has shown how with a bit of collaboration, and a lot of hard work, coastal parks needn't be resigned to redevelopment, and how big thinking from small towns is opening up entire new areas to the RV market.

The Blom family re-live their experience of Christmas on the road in South Australia

ou all know that feeling, when you drive off in your motorhome, leaving your house behind. The thoughts of, "did we close all the windows? Is there rubbish lying around? Did we bring everything we need on this trip?". It takes a few kilometres until those questions pass your mind and the further you are away from home, the more the holiday feeling starts to settle in. What is done is done, you won't turn around now and if you've forgotten anything, well, you'll just have to buy it.

And so this is how our trip to South Australia started just before Christmas last year.

For months, we'd thought about soaking up the Queensland sun,

but in the week before, a weather forecast check changed our plans. Rockhampton looked good, but temperatures were expected to get above 22 degrees overnight. South Australia was also on our wish list and still hot during the day, but the nights looked better with temperatures set to average between 16 and 18 degrees. So in an instant, we set our sights on the southern state. We had already ticked many destinations from our list, but in the nine years we had owned our motorhome, we had never been to Adelaide. So with the motorhome packed, and the kids ready (we have three children aged between six and 12 years old), we set off. We spent the first night at Jerrys Plains in the upper Hunter

Valley, a great, spacious reserve with a beautiful tennis/basketball court you can use, all for free. Note to self: don't forget to pack the tennis rackets next time. The kids loved it, with lots of space to run around and kick a ball. When we were eating our dinner under the big tree, we saw a group of kangaroos hopping past. What a great way to start a holiday. We had forgotten about home already.

BOUND FOR BROKEN HILL

Over the next few days, we set forth for Broken Hill. We love free camping, not only because of the freedom and space it provides, but also because it gets expensive to stay every night in a caravan park with three kids. On average, we pay \$80 for a powered site for the five of us and our motorhome. We'd rather spend money in local towns, at the bakery or the butcher and so on. We are very fortunate in Australia to have so many beautiful spots to camp for free.

The kids love stopping at a local pool to cool off, which is another way to support the local community. Cobar has a fantastic big pool, complete with slides and water park. We'll be going back there for sure. When we arrived in Broken Hill, we thought of visiting

the Royal Flying Doctor Service Bruce Langford Visitor Centre. It's a great little museum with handson experiences for the kids. It had been a while since we were last there, but when we parked the motorhome and got out, I heard a hissing sound. Not good! Where did it come from? Was it a snake? Then I saw one of the rear tyres had a puncture and was leaking air. While my husband tried to patch it up with duct tape (can't travel without it), I googled tyre places in Broken Hill. There was one only a few kilometres down the road towards town. We set off as quick and safe as we could, and we made it there! Luckily, they found

a tyre at the back of the shop that fitted our motorhome. It was a bit dusty, but isn't everything dusty in Broken Hill? Well, not everything as it turned out. We went to the racecourse for an overnight stay, and found a beautiful patch of green grass that cost us only \$15 a night. The next morning we were woken by the horses training and running around the track. What a great little oasis in the outback. We decided to give the museum a miss and travelled further west, bound for South Australia. The outback

journey may be long and straight with not much happening, but we love it. The scenery changes and we relish the feeling of being small and nature so overwhelming. The kids kept busy in the back spotting and counting emus. They saw more than 40 on this trip. The best time was when we were singing to the *Twelve days of Christmas* and spotted an emu at the exact moment we warbled about an emu up a gumtree. What a coincidence, or maybe we were just singing that song a lot.

CHRISTMAS AT MOONTA BAY

When we travel, we always keep an eye on the weather forecast and we saw that Christmas Day was going to be a 40 degree day. So we called ahead to some caravan parks on the Yorke Peninsula to spend those hot days by the water, instead of somewhere along the

way in the outback. We got a spot for three nights at a caravan park in Moonta Bay. We could only stay until Boxing Day as it was fully booked afterwards. But that was long enough for us. We had a great Christmas. Although it was hot, with the aircon running inside we kept our cool. The kids loved the free water park next door. Perfect for those hot days.

The busiest time of the year for camping is definitely between Boxing Day and New Year's Eve. We knew we wouldn't have much luck finding a caravan park, but we found a campsite at Innes National Park and booked it online. So we drove all the way down to the southern end of the Yorke Peninsula. We had some beautiful days there. Wow, Innes National Park is impressive! The only thing we were unprepared for were the marsh flies, which wreaked havoc on our walk around the historic town Inneston. Having sought refuge in our motorhome after being aggressively chased, we later learned that insect repellent will keep them at bay.

New Year's Eve was a quiet

evening at Port Julia, at a great camping reserve run by volunteers. After that, we drove to Barossa Valley to meet up with friends from home. We went for lunch at Maggie Beer's Farm Shop, the food was delicious. We bought some goodies to take home, although not all made it home, it was too good not to eat. Of course, we also visited some wineries, more goodies to take home.

Our next stop was Kangaroo Island, that was a holiday within our holiday, so I'll tell you more about that another time!

KEEPING SANTA A SECRET

Having owned their motorhome for nine years, the Blom family often spend Christmas on the road, renting out their Sydney home, "we immigrated a few years ago and our extended family is overseas, so for us, travelling over Christmas is easy" explains Kim.

Kim likes to book the family in somewhere comfortable for a few days in the lead up to Christmas, so the kids are settled. "After Boxing Day, it gets busy, but in the lead up to Christmas it's usually okay." Family travels put Father Christmas on the hop so Kim says, she tells them they just hope Santa is following them! The gifts, meanwhile, purchased prior to the trip, are carefully hidden as they travel.

"We have a few storage spaces the kids don't know about under the bedding and seats, and then on Christmas Eve we move the presents to the front of the motorhome when they're not looking, and hide them in big bags under a few towels."

She says celebrating Christmas on the

road stops her from going overboard. "There is only so much room in the front of the motorhome [for gifts]," she says.

"I like to pick things they can use on the trip, a book to read, and something to play and often something to wear, like bathers or a towel. We still manage to fill up two big bags!"


Decorating is also an important Christmas tradition.

"We travel with a little Christmas Tree, and bring it out everywhere we camp, the kids make Christmas-themed artworks which we put up around the motorhome.

"And you know what is easy on the road as well? Those gingerbread house kits. We make them up on Christmas Eve so we have something yummy to eat on Christmas Day."

Christmas lunch is usually a simple affair, but the kids like to get involved. "It's often pasta or salad. We're Dutch, so sometimes my daughter likes to make special pancakes and a fruit salad."

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FIFTY SHADES OF GREEN

Emma Ryan discovers the town of Tumbarumba, tucked in the verdant foothills of the Snowy Mountains

t doesn't matter from which direction you arrive in Tumbarumba, the drive will take your breath away. From the north, through the charming riverside town of Tumut, the apple orchids of Batlow and the lush rolling countryside that connects them. From the east, via Kosciuszko National Park, with its pristine forests of snow gum, its wild brumbies (the stuff of literary legend), and that incredible feat of engineering, the Snowy Hydro Scheme, and the alpine lakes and dams that go with it. From the south, via idyllic hamlets dotted along the mighty Murray River, and upon sweeping open roads, where productive cattle country sprawls under the watchful eve of the Snowy Mountains, still fulfilling their namesake during our visit in October.

If you're thinking this route between Sydney and Melbourne sounds a whole lot more interesting than the tired old Hume Highway, you'd be absolutely right. But more than just a convenient halfway point between Australia's biggest cities, Tumbarumba is a wonderful destination in its own right, particularly for the caravan and motorhome crowd. From low cost campsites which are amongst the best I've encountered, to interesting history, wonderful local produce, award winning wine, and coffee as good as your local back home, this little high country town has it all. And don't even get us started on the plethora of surrounding natural wonders that await your exploration.

GIRL ABOUT TOWN

Lured out of our cabin at the Tumbarumba Creek Caravan Park by the fragrant spring air, we headed straight for Nest Café, undeniably the best coffee in town. We were welcomed by the smiling face of Nest's owner, Laura, and her seven-month-old babe in arms, Victor, whose gummy grin and spikey hairdo had us love-struck.

It's a charming space in a reclaimed Masonic lodge, and what was doubtlessly once an austere environment is now a vibrant hub serving delicious food, and offering a boutique armchair cinema experience – complete with dinner and wine.

Alternatively, the Tumba Bakery draws a crowd most mornings, and this sunny Tuesday was no exception. We befriended a group of bikers, who were more than happy to sing their praises of the region, its windy roads with breathtaking vistas tickling them rather pink. It's little wonder this region attracts the two wheel brigade, both of the motored and human-powered variety.

SUGARPINE WALK

After a mandatory visit to the antique shop on the main street, we headed out of town to find the famous Sugarpine Walk near the town of Laurel Hill, 22km north of Tumbarumba.

A popular spot for wedding photography, the Sugarpine Walk is simply an isle of cleared pine trees amongst a forestry plantation, but it's rather beautiful. Tall, perfectly straight trees frame the cleared isle like a crowd of giant onlookers, their discarded needles forming a spongy carpet underfoot. The canopy whirs in the breeze high above, giving the illusion that perhaps, just over the next hill, you'll find the ocean. The trunks and branches creak and crack at random, causing one to whip one's head around in expectation of a companion in these otherwise lonely woods. It's all very whimsical, and you'll want to pack vour camera.

DOWN MEMORY LANE

We then headed over to the Pioneer Women's Hut, where we

were told we'd gain a vivid picture of the lives of Australian women from bygone times.

We pulled onto the museum grounds and parked the car, doing a double take at the silhouette of a bloke and two kelpies atop the property's gentle hill. Inanimate, as it happens, and as we made our introductions to museum volunteer Ann Thoroughgood, we quickly learnt the sculpture is of her late father, who ran sheep and cattle on this property and founded the Glenroy Heritage Reserve on which the museum now stands.

The main museum building – built from recycled prison cells from the nearby Mannus Correctional Centre – houses a quirky collection of domestic items that tell the tale not only of their owner or maker, but of pioneer Australian women more broadly. From hats made of tussock grass to hand-sewn dresses, the ingenuity of country women is evident everywhere you look. Most pieces were donated by relatives of their former owners, and the display tells the story of many of them.

But the jewel in the museum's crown is its quilt collection, where a wonderful assortment of handmade patchwork quilts are laid out upon antique beds, the stories of their maker presented at the foot of the bed. Ann tells me they wanted to collect something that would be both beautiful and sentimental. something that would tell deeply personal stories: a blanket made for a little boy to stay warm on the train back from boarding school; a quilt that grew layers like a tree throughout the years as the family of its maker moved to ever colder parts of Europe before migrating to Australia. These deeply personal tales are sewn together like a patchwork quilt to tell the broader story of our nation. It's really quite touching.

A SPARKLING TOWN

After soaking in all that wonderful colonial history we were able to

deduce one thing: we deserved a glass of wine. So it was off to Courabyra Wines, 6km northwest of Tumbarumba via a very pretty drive through the countryside.

Cathy Gairn greeted us at the cellar door with a mottled German shorthaired pointer dog by her side, and welcomed us into a room filled with flowers with incredible views across the vineyard to the mountains beyond. With a kids' playground and a menu that had me wishing it was lunchtime (homemade gnocchi gets me every time), I couldn't help but imagine whiling away an afternoon here amongst the stunning gardens, grazing casually on produce grown on site by Cathy, a former horticulturalist.

But alas, I was working, so it was time to get down to business and sample the wines. I know what you're thinking, it's a filthy job, but someone's gotta do it.

Cathy chatted excitedly about how she was heading to Sydney the following day to rub shoulders with industry big wigs; her sparkling wine had again won the best sparkling in NSW and she was off to collect her prize. Stocked in some of the best restaurants in Sydney, this wine is evidence of Tumbarumba's growing reputation as one of the best cool climate wine growing regions in Australia. Needless to say, I swiftly purchased a couple of bottles to enjoy in the sun that weekend. And yes, it was delicious.

PUTTING ON A SHOW

We finally tore ourselves away from Courabyra and made a beeline for a property to the west of Tumbarumba for what we'd heard was going to be quite the treat: the Boggy Creek Show.

Created and performed by fourth generation mountain cattleman Tim O'Brien, the two hour show is a thoroughly entertaining and often funny demonstration of life on the land, both past and present. Tim is a talented animal trainer, as evidenced by the impressive performance of his

working kelpies, horses, ponies, goats and even pigs. Choreographed to music and performed in the custom built arena set against the backdrop of the Snowy Mountains, the show is a fun exploration of Australiana filled with herding, horse work, whip cracking, pony races, shearing and more. Tim is entertaining and charismatic, and the show is well worth checking out. For us, it was the perfect way to end a wonderful day exploring Tumbarumba.



FREEDOM CAMPING

The Snowy Valley boasts some great freedom campsites. Here's our pick of the best, within a stone's throw of Tumbarumba.

- Henry Angel Track Head: Located just 7km from Tumbarumba, this is a sprawling, grassy freedom camp offering plenty of space, lots of shade, flushing toilets, BBQs and undercover picnic areas. Its lush greenery and mountain backdrop, combined with its proximity to town, make it our pick of the bunch.
- Paddy's River Flats: 18km outside Tumbarumba you'll find this flat, grassy campsite on Paddy's River. It has firepits, picnic tables and toilets.
- Jingellic Reserve: There's lots to love about this one, from the shady sites to the scenic location on the banks of the Murray River. Best of all, it's right next door to the historic Bridge Hotel. Jingellic is 45km southwest of Tumba. The pub has showers and toilets, so buy a beer or a meal to gain access.

Wallaman Falls



e had passed through the Hinchinbrook region of North Queensland several times but hadn't managed to have a good look around, until now. The newlyopened CMCA RV Park Ingham was an incentive to stop overnight. Warmly greeted by the custodians, we were provided with information. pamphlets of what to see and do, and directed where to park our motorhome. With the sun setting we settled into our camp chairs with a drink and antipasto plate (purchased from the Italian deli Lou's Emporium located two blocks away in the main street), and planned our sightseeing activities for the next couple of days. As the light faded, hundreds of silhouettes whooshed overhead, which turned out to be an enormous colony of flying foxes in search of their nightly food.


EXPLORING INGHAM

After a peaceful sleep, we woke to a bright and clear morning, perfect for an early ride around the cane fields and township of Ingham. Cycling is an easy way to explore an area without following the usual signed routes, and we often stumble across interesting sights. The magnificent display of Mediterranean mausoleums at the New Ingham Cemetery about 5km out of town is impressive. The uniform rows of crypts and chapels adorned with Italian names and ornate colours, resemble a miniature village set in amongst well-manicured gardens.

Heading back towards the town centre we followed the sealed track of the Great Palm Walk, over creeks and through lush tropical trees and plants to the Ingham Memorial Botanical Gardens. Inside the Bicentennial Bush House, there are numerous orchid and palm varieties, an inspiration for any lover of native gardens. The squeak and chatter from high up in the adjacent trees answered our question as to the origins of last night's mammal exodus.

Also in the gardens is the



Immigrant Remembrance Wall, commemorating the eclectic mix of settlers who made their mark in the founding of Ingham; including the town's namesake, Englishman William Bairstow Ingham. He came to the district to make his fortune in 1873, only to lose it all four years later, and then meet an untimely end in Papua New Guinea.

On the south side of town is the 271 acre (110 hectare) TYTO Wetlands site, which is a must for the avid twitcher. Boasting more than 240 different species, more than two-thirds of all Australian bird species, this land was destined to be developed until a couple of enthusiastic locals stepped in to save it. Armed with water, hats, sunscreen, insect repellent, camera, and a map from the helpful information centre, my husband and I managed to clock up 6.5 kilometres walking on the wellformed paths around lagoons and woodlands.

Bird songs accompanied us, and as we rested in hides along the way, only the sound of wings flapping and feet breaking water broke the silence. We spotted a few birds such as the colourful rainbow bee-eater, a red-browed finch, the majestic great egret and a whitebellied cuckoo-shrike. We were not so lucky to see the wetland's namesake; the Tyto capensis, or eastern grass owl. Timing and luck are everything.

Returning to the information centre we checked to see if we could add any new bird sightings to the daily board, and expanded our flora and fauna knowledge through the informative and interpretative displays. We completed our visit crossing the sugar cane bin architectural walkway to climb the 11-metre tower for 360-degree views of the wetlands and township.

Guided tours of the wetlands are available on Tuesdays and Saturdays only, and if we had more time, we would have also included a visit to the Regional Art Gallery. This natural and cultural precinct in the heart of Ingham is a real credit to the town's citizens.

The drive to Australia's highest permanent single drop waterfall. Wallaman Falls, takes about an hour from Ingham. The now fullysealed road skirts cane fields. passes through cattle grazing on and beside the road, before climbing up the range to Girringun National Park. It's best to visit in the dry season, from April to September: however, it can rain anytime so drive with caution. It's called the wet tropics for a reason! If the weather is clear, make a stop halfway up for sublime views of Hinchinbrook Island and the Herbert River Valley. Keep an eye out for the endangered southern cassowary as you journey to the top. Plunging 268 metres

from the escarpment to a 20-metre pool below, Wallaman Falls is truly spectacular. From the lookout, those with a good level of fitness can tackle the 3.2km return walk through vine forest to the base of the falls. Remember you have to come back up! There is an easier 800m Banggurru loop along the banks of Stony Creek at the camping and day-use area, where platypus, water dragons and saw-shelled turtle hang out in the rock pools.

Returning to Ingham, we stopped at the 100-year-old historic post office at Trebonne along the way. This quaint wooden building is still serving the community, for an hour each weekday afternoon. After another big day sightseeing, we bought some freshly cooked local fish with chips from Wild Local Prawns around the corner and returned to the CMCA RV park for a friendly chat, and another flying fox display.

HINCHINBROOK

The next morning we continued our tour of the Hinchinbrook region by turning east off the Bruce Highway for Lucinda, via Halifax. We passed Victoria Mill, once one of the largest sugarcane mills in the southern hemisphere, with its three tall steam stacks clearly visible in the distance. From June to November, the mill crushes 3.74 million tonnes of sugarcane, and recycles its waste

into energy and feeds power back into the electricity grid. The raw sugar produced is then transported by rail to the port village of Lucinda, home of the world's longest offshore sugar loading facility with a 6km long jetty stretching out to sea. A pity it's off limits to the public, as a spin on the bike here would have been fun!

Australia's largest island national park, Hinchinbrook Island, looms majestically in the background with its chain of rainforest clad granite crags rising to 1121 metres. As the closest mainland connection, Lucinda is the departure point for boat fishing charters in the channel or access to the well-known 32km Thorsborne Trail. The Palm Island Group is also nearby, which includes the luxury resort island of Orpheus.

The sleepy main street of Halifax, once the hub of the Herbert River district, is lined with heritage-listed mango trees and historic building facades. During the warmer months of December and January, the smell of mango hangs heavy in the air as abundant fruit falls from the trees and ferments in the hot sun.

Looping back onto the highway the road climbs north for some fantastic views of the Hinchinbrook Channel. There's a lookout at the top – well worth the stop, if there is no cloud, to take in this magnificent World Heritage Area.

There is plenty more to explore along the Hinchinbrook Way, so we will just have to come back another time. Perhaps for the

annual Australian Italian Festival in August, as the delicious fine homemade food was definitely a highlight of our stay.

The warm welcome from the custodians, plus the facilities of water, dump point and flat ground provided an easy choice for us to stay an extra night and enjoy what Ingham and surrounds has to offer.

ne of our Logan/Moreton Rambler members offered to organise an extra outing to this special event. So it was that 16 rigs camped for a couple of nights at Oakey Creek, before heading into Tara together. I felt this free camp was preparing my nostrils for the Camel Races, which I heard can get smelly. My sister thought it might be silage, but whatever it was, it spoilt the otherwise lovely, peaceful, rural setting for me, though others focused on the beautiful wide open spaces. It really is an excellent freedom camp, when not smelly. Fortunately, the offending odour was not an omen for the coming event, which we couldn't fault at all.

ESTABLISHING CAMP

The little town of Tara buzzes with life every second year when the community hosts the Tara Festival of Culture and Camel Races. We hadn't been there before, and were astounded, and impressed, with the experience. All were welcome to set up camp the Wednesday morning preceding the races, providing ample time to catch up with friends and yarn around campfires (with wood available and delivered) in the lead up to the main events.

We'd never seen so many vans, even at a National Rally! It was claimed there were 1,600 vans with a total of 15,000 people attending the festival on the main day. We don't know how the organisers kept the camping costs so low at \$25 per van for up to five days, including hot showers and toilets. Another \$35 provided three-day access to all the events and entertainment, and there was certainly plenty of that. Everything seemed to run so smoothly, from the entry to the campground, parking, provision of sufficient amenities, to the efficient scheduling of events.

RACING ACTION

Camel races are notoriously funny as the camels will do their own thing, and often head off in the wrong direction. I didn't watch too many, as being a softie I don't like to see animals hit with the crop, but we did see one camel streak early down the straight, with the



dismayed rider looking over her shoulder at the stationary line-up. No need to use a crop here that's for sure! The announcer explained camels don't always co-operate at the starting line, as once they are facing the track, they're ready to run at full gallop. Yabby races were new to us too and we were amazed at the high prices punters were bidding for each yabby, as they were auctioned off. Some fetched more than \$300! Once all are placed in the middle of a

ring, the first yabby to crawl to any edge of the circle wins. Apart from the races, which ran Friday, Saturday and Sunday, there were also sheepdog and shearing demonstrations, chainsaw and sand sculpting displays, multiple cultural demonstrations, roving entertainers, the 'Globe of Death' motorbike display, many market stalls, helicopter, camel and horse-drawn rides, plus a wide range of food offerings, bar and coffee stalls, and great raffles. The

special children's corner with fairy floss and other delights featured a mechanical bull, with clown entertainment for those waiting in queue.

SO MUCH ON OFFER

With the Camel Races and much of the entertainment starting

on Friday, we were 'wowed' with an impressive fireworks display, followed by cultural entertainers. We found it impossible to attend all that was on offer; with two stages plus other arenas. Judah Kelly, the recent winner of The Voice, was very popular, with people claiming seats an hour and a half before his performance was due to start. On Saturday morning there was a street parade in which all the children of the community participated. It was Book Week parade with a cultural, international theme. A large number of countries were represented, and the kids were dressed in all sorts of colourful and imaginative costumes, providing a delightful display. There was even a miniature Donald Trump looka-like! It was obvious the whole town and surrounding communities supported this impressive festival in so many ways.

Sunday morning started with a short, early church service followed



by a poet's breakfast. We are used to several poets taking turns to present, but Gary Fogarty was the sole entertainer and he held us captive with his tall tales. Off for a coffee after this and I was astounded to see chai latte crossed out from the menu. Fancy running out of something so fancy, so quickly, way out here?

All weekend there were Latin dancers and drummers, a Bollywood band, a Caledonian pipe band, a Caribbean steel band, a Chinese musical duo, a Reggae/ Latin and soul band, Indian musicians, Indigenous performers, country musicians, Haka dancers, Polynesian and belly dancers, as well as some buskers. What a birthday party for George! It will be hard to trump that. It is a pity that we will have to wait another two years to appreciate this biennial event again.

WARM WATERS

Leaving Tara, we bid our farewells to our friends for a wonderful camp in Goondiwindi, near the NSW/ QLD border, and the therapeutic Boomi Hot Springs. We enjoyed the artesian springs so much, we headed for more at Moree. The Gwydir Thermal Pools Motel and Caravan Park, with its range of heated pools, had recently taken over a deserted nearby resort. A huge artesian spa pool, with several waterfall features and changing coloured lights, was housed under a dome. There were plenty of change rooms and amenities plus a resort-style ambience, with potted palms, huge television screens and modern beach furniture. We couldn't resist the offer to camp over at this new area for only \$17 per night, including power, as the park was still a work in progress. Walking back to our van after an evening appreciating the warm water in the Gatsby-style surroundings, we looked up to the stars and the clear, full moon added an enchanting touch. George had more delights in store as he drove us to another one of my favourite spots, Dorrigo. Although reaching there meant an overnight stay in Armidale (where the water pipes froze and we woke to ice on the ground in the morning), it was worth it once we reached the road known as Waterfall Way. 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AND WE'RE AWAY!

Stylish and smooth to drive, it's not hard to see why you'd want a Wirraway 260SL

ildura, located on the Murray River in Victoria, might seem an odd place for a motorhome manufacturer to be located, but in fact, it's typical of Australian motorhome manufacturers to be based further afield. Wirraway is a boutique manufacturer, and under Rob Tonkin has found a successful market niche, building mostly a range of B class motorhomes. A typical example being the 260SL, the 260 being 26ft (7.9m) and the SL being a slide-out.

THE VEHICLE

Mercedes-Benz Sprinter is the Wirraway choice for its 260 range and this vehicle has a 519 CDI cab chassis that comes with a 3L V6 turbo diesel that puts out a maximum of 140kW and a very torquey 440Nm. It also comes with a GVM of 5250kg, which is higher than the normal Benz specification of 5000kg, and requires an LR licence. Having a Tare of 4600kg gives the motorhome a load capacity of 650kg.

BODYWORK

The most noticeable feature of the 260SL is of course the offside slide-out. It takes up more than two thirds of the wall area, and is electrically driven. For those who worry about such things, there is also a manual override.

Another noticeable item is the external storage capacity, of which there is plenty. Much of the storage is drawer based, which is very handy, but the rest are more conventional. There are of course the usual dedicated bins for batteries and gas cylinders, but I particularly like the ones at the nearside rear, which contain a very user friendly slide-out barbecue, and tank connected hose reel. Apart from anything else, it makes it easy to wash the motorhome down, even if not connected to mains water.

In the body building department, the 260SL has a chassis built from RHS aluminium which supports a 12mm plywood floor. Composite styrofoam/fibreglass vacuum sealed panels form up the wall structure, which includes double glazed acrylic windows and the Dometic door with glass insert. The two pack epoxy paint finish sparkles in the sunshine, increasing the longevity of the vehicle. An option fitted to this motorhome is the levelling – very handy when using the slideout.

ON THE ROAD

Driving the 260SL is certainly a pleasure. Being fitted with the most powerful of the Sprinter engines, the 140kW 3L diesel delivers the grunt when needed, but otherwise just cruises along. Certainly the Mercedes automatic gearboxes are some of the smoothest and most responsive in the business. Noise wise, there are certainly some of the expected rattles and grunts from the rear, but nothing that couldn't be fixed with a towel or cushion in the right place.


STEP INSIDE

Wirraway motorhomes come with a choice of interior decor, either a more traditional Tasmanian Myrtle timber or a modern white contemporary look. In this case, the 260SL has the latter and the overall effect is a light and bright interior. Having the full width bathroom across the rear of the motorhome does result in the perception of a very spacious interior.

There are some slide-out based motorhome layouts I have seen where the slide-out looks a bit like an afterthought rather than being integrated into the overall design. Not here, because built into the slide-out, working from rear to front are an east-west queen bed, fridge with microwave oven above and, up front a sideways facing lounge. Of course the driver's cab seats swivel around, thus forming an area for lounging and dining – the sideways









lounge having a detachable table, which is stored under the bed when not being used.

The Wanderer editor Kirstie Bedford was equally impressed with the Wirraway.

"It is a really beautiful motorhome, with a stylish bathroom and kitchen, liquor cabinet, and power points at every turn, including three in the roomy ensuite alone," she says.

"There's ample storage under the bed, a full-length pull-out pantry, and large fridge. In the ensuite is a washing machine and separate shower. For couples wanting a luxurious home-away-from-home, this motorhome is definitely the one for you." For Campervan and Motorhome Club of Australia (CMCA) CEO Richard Barwick, the build quality of the Wirraway was something to be commended.

"It's a quality vehicle, which is well-made, some of the features will allow members to enjoy the comforts of home, especially with the good storage capacity complemented by the quality of the décor."

He said the motorhome was great value for money.

POWERING UP

Sophisticated power systems sometimes put people off but in this case the 120A batteries, 130W solar panel, 25A smart charger and auto filling of the drinking water tank is all controlled by a control panel located above the entry door. That area is where the water tank, generator controls and radio/CD player are fitted, so everything is centrally located. A benefit of the electrical control system is that it's either set and forget or can be played with by those more technically inclined.

THE BOTTOM LINE

Whilst much attention is grabbed by the spacious interior of the 260SL, where the accent is very much on living area, the outside of the motorhome has much to offer as well with both its Mercedes-Benz undercarriage and the external bins that give not only easy storage access but a good number of external lifestyle features as well.

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LESSONS OF AN LR LICENCE

Kirstie Bedford talks through the trials and tribulations of getting a light rigid licence

ailing doesn't sit well with me, it never really has, but sometimes it teaches you a good lesson.

In my case, I learned that lesson after failing my first light rigid licence theory test. It was only by one point, but it was still a fail, made worse by the fact that my CEO, Adventures Group's Rob Gallagher sat it the same day, and passed. You can imagine my afternoon. It was low, but it was a very good reminder of the seriousness of obtaining a licence.

It's not that I didn't take it seriously, I just thought it would be a whole lot easier. Knowing exactly how many metres to place cones when stopped in a 12 tonne truck, and how far I can park a bus from an unmarked railway crossing didn't seem relevant for a licence to drive a motorhome.

BIG RIG LICENCES



But, such is the nature of the licence, you have to understand the workings of a fatigue management diary, and what to do with hydraulic and auxiliary brakes in an emergency, so it was back to the books, for the entire weekend.

With the help of my 12-year-old son (who was determined nothing was going to stop us taking the Paradise Independence Deluxe motorhome up the east coast of Queensland for nine days), I studied the VicRoads truck and bus drivers' handbook, and when I re-sat the theory, under the watchful eye of the great team at TDT Training, I passed with flying colours (well, practically).

Making me feel somewhat better, TDT Training told me that it is the most failed component of the licence, and many fail by up to 24 questions.

SO WHY DO IT?

In my case I had committed to driving the seven tonne, 28-foot Paradise to the CMCA rally (with the family in tow), and, as editor of *The Wanderer*, I want to be able to intrinsically write about the experiences readers are having.

For others, besides the legal requirement, it's about having confidence when driving a big rig, or a bus full of school children.

TDT Managing Director Dr Brett Roberts says the reason for getting a licence is also quite simply one of safety.

"Heavy vehicles are not cars and cannot be driven or handled the same way, they are longer, wider and heavier. A common error with new drivers is that they think the truck will respond the same way as a car and as a result they don't give themselves enough time to

prepare, be it stopping, turning or changing lanes.

"Training helps reduce accidents. At TDT we aim to provide our students with the best possible knowledge and skills to begin them on their journey."

And, if the stats are anything to go by, more people are realising the importance and value in having a heavy vehicle licence. "Heavy vehicles are not cars and cannot be driven or handled the same way. A common error with new drivers is that they think the truck will respond the same way as a car."

TDT Training says it has seen an increase in LR/MR licences in the last 12 months alone by about 10%, with about 800 licences delivered through its branches in 2017.

THE PROCESS

Your first requirement is to sit the theory test. My advice is don't just flick through the handbook and do a few online tests. Study it thoroughly.

Our trainer Mike Rinaldi, who has been training since 2004, says like me, most people fail the first time. He says it's because of the complexity of the questions, and how they specifically related to the truck sector, so if you are getting a



licence to drive an RV, or a bus, and you aren't immersed in industry, it becomes a little tougher.

However, the process in sitting the theory is really quite easy. You turn up and the staff ask you to fill in a bit of paperwork and then you are escorted into a quiet room, and you are given one of a series of tests. You can get six questions wrong to pass.

It's best to do the theory at least two days before the practical because you can only re-sit it twice on one day, so if you fail twice, you need to go back another day.

The practical is typically a full (or half) day of driving training, followed by a driving test. The trainers are personable, helpful, and they'll even take you for a cuppa to calm the nerves!

Regardless of how long you've been driving, in my case 25 years, don't underestimate the process the trainers will put you through. You need to be vigilant at all times, and as Rob Gallagher says, anyone looking at driving a motorhome, or large caravan, should consider doing it, even as a refresher.

"When I recently picked up a motorhome in the Northern Territory with my family, I was far more comfortable driving it than I would have been had I not done the test. When it comes to compliance and safety, understanding the way to drive this size of vehicle, you'll feel much safer having done it."

He says it also leaves you with a greater awareness of the challenges of heavy vehicles as a normal driver.

"Having gone through it, you know when a truck can or can't see you in their mirror, where before you tend to make assumptions."

BIG RIG LICENCES

It's something I too felt incredibly helpful when driving the Queensland coast to the CMCA rally in Bundaberg. You come out of the test considering truck signs, road signs and road markings, where as before-hand it's easy to become complacent.

Gallagher says as a business focused on consumer safety in this category, "I'd like to see courses like this become more common practice. It can only be a positive step in helping keep drivers safe."

As to the future of training, Dr Roberts says while technology will increase, nothing beats driving experience, "when dealing with heavy vehicles, online training can never replace time behind the wheel. There may be a move to more online theory and knowledge training, but the only way to learn and experience a heavy vehicle is to spend time in the seat driving and preparing for all possible road situations".

TOP TIPS

- Study, study, study
- Practice the modules available and provided to you on TDT's website via its e-learning system, the 'Moodle platform' – road rules can differ from state to state, so it's best to follow the tests you are given by your training professional
- On the day of practical test, wear sensible shoes and be prepared for a long intense day – get a good night's sleep and eat well that morning
- Remember if I can get it, then so can you!

LICENCE CLASSES

Light rigid (LR)

- Has a gross vehicle mass (GVM) more than 4.5 tonnes but not more than 8 tonnes
- Seats more than 12 adults (including the driver) and has a GVM not more than 8 tonnes

Medium rigid (MR)

• Has a GVM more than 8 tonnes and has no more than 2 axles

Heavy rigid (HR)

- Has a GVM more than 8 tonnes and has 3 or more axles (whether or not the wheels on those axles are on the road)
- A bus consisting of more than one rigid section, which are connected to one another so as to allow rotary movement and passenger access between the sections

Heavy combination (HC)

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POWER TO G

David Cook reveals what you need to know about lithium battery starters

hen you're frequently on the road, a little doubt niggles every time you feed your key into the ignition: will there be that reassuring spin followed by the engine bursting into happy life? Fortunately, those doubts usually evaporate and without thinking we accept the systems operating our vehicles will serve us well. But every now and then they fail to the sad, slow turn of the crankshaft or worse still, to a 'click, click' sound.

THE BATTERY HAS CARKED IT

In the past, a jump start required a willing traveller able to get their battery close enough to yours for the jumper leads to reach, or one those handy, if hefty, jump starters, with leads connected to wet cell battery encased in a poly box. But in recent times, small lithium polymer battery packs are now claiming to achieve the same thing.

The sales hype quotes figures in the many thousands of milliamps (mA) and we are assured one will fit in our shirt pocket or handbag. But can they really do the job? Well, the short answer is mostly yes, but sometimes, no.

A unit's ability to start a vehicle depends on its stored power capacity, the type of vehicle, and the degree of discharge in the vehicle's battery.

IGNORE THE MILLIAMPS

A milliamp is just one thousandth of an amp, and they look better than amps, because there are more of them. It's best to ignore the quoted figures for amps and cold cranking amps, the usual measure for a battery's ability to turn over an engine. Manufacturers may quote a peak amperage at the jumper unit's terminal, which lasts a nanosecond or so, and is well over what's sustained at the battery clamps for even a few seconds. A watthour (Wh) rating is more reliable, where one watt-hour equals the consumption of a watt of energy for one hour, as it must meet a global standard for transport purposes.

WHY GO LITHIUM?

Although older wet-cell starters are effective back-ups for your



batteries, technology has improved the functionality of our batterypowered items. Lithium-based batteries sustain their voltage output from fully-charged to almost dead flat, are quicker to charge, hold their charge longer, are generally more tolerant of misuse and are much lighter and smaller than battery with other chemistries.

All lithium battery packs should have over-discharge protection. Generally, the power pack will turn off around 8.5V to 9.5V. In terms of jump starters, this means considerable savings in size and weight - with many units weighing less than a kilogram. Some can be used as torches, have USB ports for charging phones or laptops, or connections for tyre compressors. In referring to "lithium polymer" (often shortened to LiPo) we are more correctly talking about lithium-ion technology that uses a high solid (gel) polymer electrolyte instead of the more commonly used liquid electrolyte.

There are no Australian standards for these products but many power packs cells are UL-rated, which is a stringent USA standard.

CAPACITY

Engine size greatly impacts in the demands made on a jump starter, simply because of the number and size of components that must be turned over. Generally, petrol-fuelled vehicles will require minimum output peak current of:

- 4 cylinders 150-200 amps
- 6 cylinders 200-400 amps
- 8 cylinders 250-500 amps

Diesels, which have much higher internal compression ratios, will require minimum capacities of:

- 4 cylinders 300-500 amps
- 6 cylinders 400-700 amps
- 8 cylinders 600-1200 amps

These figures can be regarded as minimums, so aim for something higher if you can afford it to ensure you have a margin of safety.

OPERATING EXTREMES

Many jump starters will operate in any ambient temperature you're likely to experience in Australia but some won't, so do your research, and read all the instructions before use. The temperature in a vehicle boot can reach 90 degrees Celsius or more on a hot day, and that will be above the operating maximum for any jump starter. At lower temperatures (around freezing) the performance of any jump starter will be greatly impaired. Extremely low temperatures will impose an added load on any jump starter attempting to turn over an engine by slowing the chemical reactions which produce the current flow.

Do your research and read the documentation on your proposed unit to ensure you are within operating parameters.

CABLING

Look for a unit that has wellshielded sturdy battery clamps: the harder they are to put on the better they will grip the battery terminals and do their job of making a good electrical connection. The larger the gauge of the cables the less resistance to current flow to the vehicle's battery and so, the more efficient it is likely to be. You also don't want excessively long cables, to minimise resistance, but not so short that you can't comfortably connect the terminals and have the jump starter battery securely seated on surrounding structure (don't sit it on the battery).

START-ELING CLAIMS

Be wary of claims regarding the number of 'starts' that can be made from a jump starter pack. A completely flat battery in a car will draw much more from the jump starter battery than one that is down only enough to just prevent the car's starter from cranking over the engine. The number of starts on one charge will depend on the state of the vehicle's battery.

KEEP IT CHARGED

One of the biggest problems that is likely to arise in the use of a battery jump starter is that it may not be fully charged when you need it. Despite its lithium technology it will slowly self discharge, so you need to a have a disciplined approach to keeping it topped up from the mains supply at home - put it on your checklist of pre-trip things to do. Read your unit's paperwork, as some recommend charging annually, others every three months. If uncertain, a regime close to the latter will help sustain the battery and won't create any problems. These are complex and sometimes delicate devices, as illustrated by some of the warranties, which are as short as six months.

SAFETY

LiPo batteries adhere to stringently-enforced aircraft transport regulations for a reason, so be sure to take care. So always use the dedicated charging unit to maintain your LiPo jumpstarter, or any other appliance

CRUNCHING THE NUMBERS

All lithium cobalt polymer (lithium ion common name) battery cells are 3.7V each. There are usually three cells in a jump start power pack connected in series (3S), which gives a nominal voltage of 11.1 volts. Fully charged they are usually 12.5V. To determine the capacity in a lithium battery power pack, e.g. 120Whrs, divide by 3.7V = 32,430mAh (32.43Ahr), or 3.7V x 32.43 = 120Whrs. This is the formula that is used worldwide for all shipping and airfreight. To convert watt-hours to amps divide by volts. In other words a 120Wh jump starter pack will produce a notional 10 amps (120 divided by 12) in a 12V system. Overstating of battery capacity in these products is quite common so be aware. Battery capacity provides power. The larger the capacity the more jump start power the unit should have. Like any type of battery the price you pay is related to the claimed capacity of the battery pack. A very rough guide as to the maximum peak amps at the jumper clamps you should expect when jump starting a vehicle is to multiply the claimed capacity in watt hours by a factor of 10. For example, a claimed 60Whrs capacity x 10 should produce a maximum peak current at the clamps of 600A. The maximum cell power claims in the thousands of amps can be a little confusing. MCP is the claimed absolute power output of the battery cell itself for a period of less than 0.5 seconds. As it takes longer than 0.5 seconds to jump start a car one would assume that MCP is a marketing ploy, but not quite so. Generally the higher MCP claim will give you a higher claimed maximum peak current and maximum start current. Maximum peak clamp current is the current required to initially turn the engine over for around three seconds until the flywheel and inertia of all the moving parts in the engine takes over.

We are indebted to Ross Loudon, Managing and Technical Director of Smart Jump Starters for his assistance with this. with a rechargeable battery for that matter. Labelling and checking your chargers before plugging them in will avoid this issue.

Overcharging, excessive discharging, over-temperature, short circuit, crush or penetration issues can cause structural failure, leaking electrolyte and fire. That said, the appropriate design of ancillary equipment minimises these risks, but as with all lithiumpolymer battery-powered items, you are dealing with something with high-energy density - which you shouldn't be casual about.

TAKING TO THE AIR

For air transport, 160Wh is the maximum battery capacity permitted and it must be carried on as hand luggage and be in its enclosed carry case with the terminals not exposed. Always check an airline's battery policy before fronting up to the airport, as it can change regularly depending on any recent happenings around the world.

SALT AND VINEGAR FISH IN BEER BATTER 1 cup (125g) plain flour, plus extra ½ tsp ground black pepper

1 cup (125g) plain flour, plus extra for dusting 1 egg, whisked 1 tsp garlic powder

PREPARATION

In a bowl, add the flour, egg, garlic, pepper and mix until combined. Add the beer and mix until combined.

600g firm fish fillets

In the meantime, crush the packet of chips with a rolling pin. Dry the fish with paper towel, then dust in a plate of flour before dipping the fish in the batter Roll the battered fish in the crushed chips and pat firmly to help chips stick to the fish. Shallow fry in vegetable oil.

TASTY BARBECUE CHICKEN MARINADE

½ cup brown sugar
½ cup balsamic vinegar
½ cup soy sauce
¼ cup olive oil
2 tbsp worcestershire sauce

2 tbsp sesame oil 4 cloves garlic, chopped ½ tsp ground black pepper 1.5kg chicken pieces or wings

PREPARATION

Whisk together the brown sugar, vinegar, soy sauce, olive oil, worcestershire sauce, sesame oil, garlic, and pepper, until the sugar has dissolved.

Add your chicken to a large zip-lock bag and pour in the marinade. Refrigerate for two hours or overnight. Cook over the grill section of your barbecue, brushing liberally with leftover marinade.

SOUTHERN STROLLS

TIDAL RIVER

Wilsons Promontory NP, VIC Wilsons Promontory (aka 'the Prom') is the southernmost point of the Australian mainland. Tidal River, 30km inside the park boundary, is the focus for tourism and recreation, with numerous walking trails fanning out from here through temperate rainforests and coastal wilderness to towering granite mountains and sugar-white beaches.

One of the best day walks begins at the carpark opposite the visitor centre and meanders on a 1km boardwalk (the Loo-Errn Track) over pristine wetlands to the south bank of Tidal River. Crossing a footbridge, with platforms allowing access for fishing, the trail climbs to Tidal Overlook, the highest point between Norman and Leonard Bays, with panoramic views across the riverine wetlands to Mount Oberon.

The trail soon intersects a circuit that encompasses Pillar Point. Turning right leads to an outcrop of granite boulders with splendid views toward the rocky summit of



Mount Bishop. Continuing on the circuit track through banksia heath and wildflowers takes walkers out along the ridge to Pillar Point, a headland with breathtaking views of Norman Beach and Mount Oberon to the south, and Leonard Bay to the north.

From the headland, walkers can either continue the loop back to Tidal River or pick up the Squeaky Beach Track for a moderate 2km (one way) descent through bushland to Leonard Bay. Either way, a refreshing swim awaits you at a magnificent surf beach. Above: Footbridge across Tidal River

2DOVE LAKE HIGH CIRCUIT Cradle Mountain NP, TAS

Cradle Mountain is the starting point of the iconic, multi-day Overland Track, but the majority of visitors come to Dove Lake on a day pass, looking to step out on one (or more) of the many excellent walks in the area.

The most popular is the Dove Lake Loop Track, a 6km (Grade 2) circuit that takes about two hours. But for those looking for a more challenging excursion, the Dove Lake High Circuit is highly recommended. This Grade 4 hike begins at the lakeside carpark and follows the Dove Lake Loop along the eastern shore to Glacier Rock, the top of which affords an excellent view across the lake to Cradle Mountain.

Further on, it connects with the Lake Rodway Track, where chains have been installed in rough gullies to assist the steep ascent towards Hanson's Peak (1185m). At the top, the track continues south across an exposed granite saddle with spectacular panoramic views. Just beyond Lake Hanson and the Twisted Lakes is a junction where

the Face Track diverts steeply towards Little Horn (1355m), then skirts beneath the dolerite ramparts of Weindorfers Tower and Smithies Peak.

Part way along this section, the Lake Wilks Track descends the mountain (using more chains) past an alpine tarn to re-join the Dove Lake Loop and return via the primeval Ballroom Forest and the boat shed back to the carpark.

According to my Fitbit, this is about 10km, 15,000 steps and 161 floors – and a fantastic way to see one of the best-known natural wonders in the Tasmanian Wilderness World Heritage Area.

OUTDOOR: WALKING

SNAKE LAGOON Flinders Chase NP, SA

This rugged wilderness is at the western extremity of Kangaroo Island. As well as iconic features like Admirals Arch and the aptly named Remarkable Rocks, the park contains a network of walking trails, including the 4.2km (return) Snake Lagoon hike.

This popular 'Great South Australian Short Walk' is of moderate difficulty and begins at the secluded Snake Lagoon campground. The trail is a flat and sandy path for the first kilometre as it traces a ridgeline through woodland of mallee and sugar gum. This is a great opportunity to observe some of the abundant wildlife, including Tammar wallabies, Rosenberg's goannas, short-beaked echidnas, scarlet robins and golden whistlers.

Gradually, the track descends into Rocky River Valley and crosses the watercourse on a footbridge, which may be submerged when the river is swollen by winter rains. In the arid heat of summer, the river can shrink to achain of isolated billabongs above the crossing, while below it the valley floor is exposed to reveal a corridor of bare serrated ridges and folds of rock.

For the next kilometre, the trail meanders beside rock formations in

the riverbed that become increasingly dramatic as it approaches the mouth. Near the end, the river cascades (seasonally) over a jagged waterfall before tumbling the last few hundred metres onto a snowy-white sand beach. At the shore of this clandestine cove, the surf rolls in off a turquoise Southern Ocean to complete a scene of coastal splendour.

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


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WHAT'S NEW



The vehicle must have installed the necessary fit for purpose manufactured equipment to be considered as self-contained.

Water Supply

- The vehicle shall have a fresh water tank or bladder specifically manufactured for the storage of potable water. This tank may be on-board (fitted) or external (non-fitted).
- The fresh water tank should be of rigid construction with appropriate valves to prevent foreign matter or contaminants entering the tank.
- When travelling, any portable water container shall be securely fastened within the confines of the vehicle so as not to cause any hazard.

Sink/shower

- The vehicle shall be fitted with an installed and plumbed sink. Additional sinks, hand basins and shower are optional. Every sink, hand basin or shower fitted shall be supplied with water from the fresh water tank, and shall be drained to a grey water tank.
- External showers that are used for ablutionary purposes and in so doing create grey water would not comply. External water outlets used for rinsing or filling purposes are not seen as a grey water issue within the context of this policy.

Grey Water

- No grey water is to be discharged from a self-contained vehicle unless allowable by local authorities or access to a dump point is impractical.
- Sinks, and where fitted hand basins and showers, shall be drained to either an on-board (fitted) grey water tank or an external (non-fitted) grey water tank (tote).

Toilet

TRUSTING YOUR INSTINCTS

My friend and I recently returned from a trip to Far North Queensland up to Cooktown and the Tablelands with my reliable old Mercedes-Benz Sprinter, called Sprinting Frog (the same as in the July 2017 edition of The Wanderer, page 77). On the way from visiting the caves near Chillagoe back to Mareeba, I noticed suddenly a funny noise when turning the steering wheel. On recommendation we went to Cairns to a special power steering business. All the mechanics listened to the noise, they had no idea what it could be and recommended avoiding the more remote inland route we had planned just in case something more serious happened.

At Balgal Beach a fellow traveller whom I told the story to, recommended a helpful diesel mechanic, who would surely find out what it could be.

What a shock to hear there that we could have had an accident at any time and we needed a new steering rack. It was ordered; we spent the night at a free-parking spot 25km away and then most of the waiting time at a nearby takeaway shop till the new rack was flown in. On the next day late afternoon (a Friday) the vehicle was ready to go - we thought. While a mechanic went on a quick test drive, we wanted to leave as soon as the vehicle comes back, and went in the office to fix up the bill. The sum of \$2,900 was surely above my expectation. Asking for a discount as I had to pay cash (my reserve), I saved \$300 but did not receive a receipt when I asked for it. Happy that we would be able to continue our trip, I didn't bother. What a mistake. We were told the vehicle was safe to drive but we have to come back on Monday as it was still not performing to satisfaction. We found a caravan park only 5km away and spent the weekend there. After another six hours waiting on Monday, I had to pay another \$400 for other mechanical repairs - with no idea what for, really, and again got a discount of \$100. Again, I didn't get a receipt. But we got green light to go wherever we wanted to, everything should be just fine now.

Trusting that we had avoided a major accident and a bill like this belongs to a trip, we drove off with destination Julia Creek, before turning south and eventually home.

Towards Charters Towers on a straight road and less noise of traffic we realised that the wheels pulled to the right, the steering wheel (with straight wheels) pointed to 11 o'clock and the noise was still there, only a bit softer. We did not drive back.

A helpful mechanic in Blackall aligned the wheels and fixed the steering wheel. I paid another \$75, no further problems and we enjoyed the rest of our trip.

At home I booked the Sprinter in for an oil change and told my trustworthy mechanic of six years the whole story. When I picked up the vehicle, he looked at me and shook his head: they had really ripped you off. He said the steering rack was not new, the mechanics forgot to put back brackets, screws were loose, a part touched the brake hose (we were lucky that it didn't start leaking) and the noise came from a pipe, which must have hit a rock and touched the motor block. The noise travelled up the steering rack like on a telephone line, starting the whole story. Replacing the steering rack was unnecessary. My mechanic even took photos just in case I needed proof. Apart from the oil change, I had to pay another \$250 to get the mess fixed.

Warning to all Grey Nomads in a situation like mine: trust your instinct and not all mechanics, pay a bit more and make sure you get a receipt.





RV Friendly Town: Macarthur, VIC

Macarthur is a small rural township, located 311km west of Melbourne. The town was named after General Edward Macarthur in 1857; however, prior to this it was known as Eumeralla, an aboriginal term thought to mean 'Valley of Plenty'. The town offers a small service centre including a pub, post office, chemist, rural supply store, and milk bar.

Macarthur Recreation Reserve, located along the Port Fairy-Hamilton Road, allows parking for up to 72 hours. Donations are requested for unpowered sites, and for those requiring power, a fee of \$10 per vehicle per night applies. A dump point is located at the site, along with toilets and barbecues, and a limited water supply is also available. Pets are permitted on leads.

Macarthur serves as a gateway to Mount Eccles National Park, popular for its long dormant volcano Mount Eccles, also known as Budj Bim. Within its crater lies the tranquil Lake Surprise, as well as a variety of walking trails including the Natural Bridge and Lava Canal.

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
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RV Friendly Destination: Venushill B&B, Coober Pedy SA

A TOTAL RE-BERTH

We spell out the pros and cons of buying an ex-rental





When choosing a pre-loved motorhome, you may wish to consider an ex-rental, particularly if you're on a tight budget. Like any purchase, there are always going to be pluses and minuses, so I thought I'd share what to weigh up when it's time to buy.

THE PROS

Let's look at the pluses first. Generally speaking, most rental motorhomes are built for rugged use and often for firsttime travellers. Apart from anything else, the latter objective makes them fairly easy to use. For the most part, they are designed for people who stay in caravan parks, saving on weight for extra batteries, chargers, solar panels, and inverters. There are exceptions, with a few operators offering purposebuilt rentals or a fleet similar to what's available on the retail market.

Having talked to a few rental operators in the business, I know they often use cab-chassis and or vans either known for their reliability and/ or readily-available with a cheaper range of spare parts. The Ford Transit was a classic example, often chosen for those very reasons. When the Transit



disappeared from the Ford range, the operators had to look elsewhere.

Often rental motorhomes and vans are built to a budget, and therefore are quite simple in design, particularly in their interior cabinetry. For the handyworker who likes to tinker but doesn't have the capability for a fullblown rebuild, refurbishing an ex-rental to suit personal tastes can be a lot of fun, without the fear of devaluing a brand-new motorhome. One tip here is to make sure you use the motorhome a few times with the existing facilities before trying any changes. Another is to use a qualified tradersperson for any LP gas or 240V mains electrical changes required. Twelve-volt wiring isn't regulated to the same extent, but it's still a good idea to know what you are doing, especially with extra batteries and solar panels.

This might sound a bit odd but any vehicle can have inherent weaknesses surface after a few years' use. An advantage of buying any used motorhome, not just a rental one, is that known problems can either be researched, recognised, repair-costed or discarded as appropriate. An example of this is the AMT gearboxes used in older Mercedes-Benz Sprinter and VW Crafter motorhomes. They have always been hesitant in lower range gear changes and whilst it's a problem, it's always been there.

THE CONS

For the most part, rental motorhomes will have a high number of kilometres on the tacometre, normally between 250,000 and 300,000km. Occassionally, though, rental motorhomes are sold much earlier than that. Across the Tasman, KEA's NZ operation sells motorhomes used for less than a year, providing sufficient milliage to allow any technical/mechanical/functional problems to show without having too many kilometres on the clock.

Almost certainly a rental motorhome

will have had plenty of use, often with inexperienced drivers who come from overseas. Similarly, the users often have had minimal experience with the appliances, which can suffer accordingly. That said, most experienced rental companies will have a good back-up facility, knowing all the tricks and techniques for a quick repair.

Another recognised problem is that rental motorhome layouts are often built for a purpose. So a base vehicle normally used in a two-berth retail model can be fitted out with four- or six-berth configurations. As a result, they rarely have fixed beds, and are more likely to offer day/night lounges, so the beds have to be made up every night. For a couple that can be annoying but there are ways around that. For instance, a six-berth motorhome can be set so the Lutonpeak bed or rear club lounge remains made, leaving what is usually the fourseat dinette in the middle for sitting and eating.

KEA has taken a different approach with its Beach motorhome by fully removing the club lounge in the rear



and replacing it with a fixed island bed. An interesting idea that offers potential elsewhere.

Lack of external bin storage is often an issue for some rental motorhomes and there's no real way around that, except by learning to travel more lightly. Not that there is anything wrong with that I should point out.

FINAL CHECKS

There are a few other considerations, of course, but they are the major ones. As with any second-hand motorhome purchase, mechanical and functional checks by qualified personnel are recommended. In the case of the 'house' area that's less of an issue and can be done mostly by opening and closing everything, checking obvious leak marks and noting obvious damage marks. An extended test drive is mandatory. One final benefit of buying an exrental is my favourite. It's very easy to try before you buy and so get an understanding of both the motorhome lifestyle and the particular motorhome under consideration.


